- Australia's first match on day two in Vancouver will be their 1,000th in series history – the fourth (of fifth if Samoa play first) team to reach the milestone after New Zealand, Fiji and South Africa
- Australia's last title came on home soil in Sydney in 2018 when they did the double alongside the women's team
- Australia qualified for Tokyo 2020 by winning the Oceania regional qualifier in November. They also won the Oceania Rugby Sevens title
- Australia have won Cup titles in Wellington, Shanghai and Malaysia (2001), Brisbane (2002), London (2010), Tokyo (2012) and Sydney (2018)
